Description

The Allure of Empire explains how the United States emerged as a Pacific power in the four decades leading up to World War II by carefully managing its inter-imperial relationship with Japan across the color line. It focuses on how the United States calibrated its imperial and immigration policies to accommodate Japan's rise as an imperial partner. It also explores how these policies encouraged Japanese and Korean Americans in California, as well as various Asian elites in Japan, Korea, China, and the Philippines, to secure their self-interests by appealing to the United States empire, rather than participating in radical social movements that aimed to rid the world of imperialism.

Dr Chris Suh is Associate Professor of History at Emory University, USA, where he teaches US-East Asia relations and Asian American history. His book, *The Allure of Empire*, received an Honorable Mention for the Stuart L. Bernath Prize for the best first book from the Society for Historians of American Foreign Relations (SAHFR).
